Everything and Every Thing..... from Deb Huber

I'm reading *The Universal Christ* for Adult Ed and doing some *Lectio Divinia* (contemplative reading) as the author (Richard Rohr) recommends in the introduction. Some key phrases from this book that I've been working with are "Christ is everywhere," and "Everything visible, without exception, is the outpouring of God." Every tangible thing is "Christ-soaked," as Rohr has put it – everything.

I've always loved moving water – being in it, floating on it, or sitting beside it. We are lucky to live where we do and still have some public access to this water. I ran across this prayer by Sarah Bessy that ties the idea of a Christ-soaked world with my love of rivers, so I'd like to share parts of it with you here.

Instructions For an Evening of Your Life

Find a bit of water to look at, it doesn't have to be much..go there alone at sunset. Alone. Late in the day.

Leave behind the book. Leave behind your prayer journal. Leave behind the notebooks and schedule planning. Leave behind the mobile phone—if you're in a good spot, there won't be any reception anyways.

And here is your assignment: sit down and watch the water. That's exactly it. Sit in silence at the end of the water and learn to be satisfied.

This is the tricky part when your life is full with good and necessary and hard things, I know. Your mind will jump around from thing to thing to thing. You'll feel guilty and then you'll feel indolent. You'll feel like time has slowed down....You'll get restless. You'll think of all the Things You Should Be Doing. You'll feel twitchy perhaps...Be silent and watch the water. Do one thing right now and do it with your whole self.

Prayer will come, it just might look a bit different than you expect...You'll start to notice life as it is happening in that moment...Become acquainted with the silence in your own world; you might be surprised by the sound of you.

Let the sun set over the water. Be baptized in the gracious last light of the day.

PRAYERS NEEDED FOR THOSE IMPACTED BY HURRICANES HELENE AND MILTON

I recently travelled to Florida to visit some friends who had moved there from New Jersey. While I was there, Hurricane Helene hit. It was heartbreaking to see the damage and realize how severely people's lives were impacted. Tide surges went through some homes leaving sand and debris filling them. In the days following the hurricane, people had dragged most, if not all, of their ruined furniture to the curb to be hauled away.

After I returned to Montana, Hurricane Milton roared into the area with its eye landing, again, on the gulf coast. Luckily there was no significant damage to the homes of my friends. However, the area that was already impacted suffered. Even today, bridges and roads are closed to everyone except home owners who need to salvage what is left, if anything.

Also, many, many business have felt the impact of this disaster. Some restaurants have over 4 feet of water in their kitchens and dining areas. Waterfront establishments are pretty well washed out. Appliances are destroyed as well as just about everything else in them. Many stores have lost their entire inventory as well. It's hard to fathom how many jobs have been lost due to the storms. And it is right at the beginning of the tourist season. I can't imagine how most of these businesses will be ready to open to take advantage of it.

Similar tragedies have happened as the storm moved north, particularly in North Carolina. The loss of lives is heartbreaking.

FEMA is offering some assistance at this time, with more in the future. Unfortunately, many do not have adequate flood insurance, if any.

So, I am asking for your prayers for those whose lives have been turned upside down by these horrendous disasters.
